The Big Questions

Should students be involved in social change and development projects as part of the studies?

How can mobility programs in the Asia-Pacific be designed ethically?

All you will do in a Mexican village is create disorder... At worst, in your "community development" spirit you might create just enough problems to get someone shot after your vacation ends – and you rush back to your middleclass neighborhoods where your friends make jokes about "spits" and "wetbacks." ...

Suppose you went to a U.S. ghetto this summer and tried to help the poor there "help themselves." Very soon you would be either spit upon or laughed at... People who understand that your own bad consciences push you to this gesture would laugh condescendingly. Soon you would be made aware of your irrelevance among the poor, of your status as middle-class college students on a summer assignment. ...

Come to look, come to climb our mountains, to enjoy our flowers. Come to study. But do not come to help.

Tackling "Heropreneurship"

Heropreneur (noun): a founder who greatly admired, as if a hero, and viewed as the main actor in social progress *Papi-Thornton (2016)*

Apprenticing with a Problem encourages innovation through a range of social impact roles and career options, building on and adding to existing initiatives rather than reproducing the same mistakes. By celebrating "building on" we aim for fewer innovations designed in a vacuum, less pressure for students to prove that they and their solution are unique, and more targeted and effective social entrepreneurial activity that fills real needs. *Skoll Founation – Hartigan (2017)*

- 3. Ethical practice and approaches

- Would the students be allowed to do this in Australia?
 - Consider supervision / technical work / engagement with different groups.
- Does this promote religious activities or proselytise?
- Is this volunteer or community work that could be done locally? Does it displace local work?
- Is there engagement with children or vulnerable people? How is this managed?
